




# Is this New Mexico's Miguel Gallegos?

#### Henrietta M. Christmas

Found in: Hillerkuss, Thomas. *Diccionario Biográfico del Occidente Novohispano: Siglo XVI*. Vol. 2, *D-G*. Zacatecas: Universidad Autónoma de Zacatecas, Centro de Docencia Superior, 2001.

#### GALLEGOS, Miguel

Escribano en la villa de Nombre de Dios, en junio y noviembre de 1564. Cuando fue celebrada la almoneda pública de los bienes de Sancho Jiménez, difunto, el día 28 de ese mismo mes y año, Gallegos compró tres sábanas viejas, por 6 pesos; tres camisas de Ruán, viejas, por 7 pesos; una sobrecama, vieja, por 2 pesos; y 60 fanegas de maíz, por 120 pesos. Llama la atención el hecho de que siendo el escribano del remate, resultó ser el comprador más importante, por lo que se pueda suponer que esta almoneda se efectuó a puerta cerrada.

El 27 de marzo de 1567 en la villa de Nombre de Dios, como notario apostólico -por mandato de fray Pedro de Espinareda, juez de lo espiritual, por comisión del obispo Don fray Pedro de Ayala-, inició un proceso contra Guillén Bernal, por el delito de infidencia, el cual fue el primer proceso formal del Santo Oficio en tierras de la Nueva Vizcaya. El proceso aún siguió en 1569 (Hoyo, 1978: 519; Porras Muñoz, 1980: 385: MS 132a)

#### GALLEGOS, Miguel

Scribe in the town of Nombre de Dios, in June and November of 1564. When the public auction of the assets of the deceased Sancho Jiménez was held, on the 28th of that same month and year, Gallegos bought three old bedsheets, for 6 pesos; 3 old Rouen shirts, for 7 pesos; an old bedspread, for 2 pesos; and 60 fanegas of corn, for 120 pesos. It is noteworthy that being the scribe of the auction, he turned out to be the most important buyer, for which it can be supposed that this auction was carried out behind closed doors.

On March 27, 1567, in the town of Nombre de Dios, as apostolic notary - by mandate of Fray Pedro de Espinareda, judge of the spiritual, by commission of the bishop Don Fray Pedro de Ayala - he initiated a process against Guillén Bernal, for the crime of infidelity, which was the first formal process of the Holy Office in the lands of Nueva Vizcaya. The process was still ongoing in 1569 (Hoyo, 1978: 519; Porras Muñoz, 1980: 385; MS 132a).
