PICURIS, NEW MEXICO BURIALS IN 1843

Submitted by Henrietta M. Christmas

While helping Mary Peterson work on Picuris baptisms, we pulled all the loose documents to add them to the upcoming baptism books. In doing so, a few burials were found, and we opted not to include them in the baptism book but to publish them outside of that venue. There are few, but they are descriptive, and all signed by Padre Antonio José Martinez, from Taos. The source document is AASF Reel 55, frames 662-664.

Frame 662

- Juan de los Reyes Casillas March 16, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry at the cemetery of San Jose de las Trampas. He died January 22 of this year. Parvulo, one year old, legit s/ Tomas Casillas and Maria Soledad Sisneros, from the plaza of San Juan Nepomuceno.
- Dadislao Cordoba March 16, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José
 Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry at the parish
 cemetery. He died on the 14th of this month, husband of Maria Dolores Vialpando.
 He died suddenly.
- Andres Casillas March 17, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José
 Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry at the capilla
 of San Jose de Trampas. He died suddenly on the 3rd of this month. Husband in
 his second marriage to Maria de la Luz Duran, from San Juan Nepomuceno. He
 left three children from his first marriage and one from the second.

Frame 663

- Maria Manuela Herrera April 22, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry at the cemetery of the parish. Parvula of two years old, legit d/ Antonio Aba de Herrera and Maria Soledad Trujillo, from the plaza of Chamisal.
- Maria Guadalupe Muñis April 28, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry at the cemetery. Legit d/ Reyes Muñis and Maria de Gracia Medina, from Chamisal.
- Maria Juliana Leon April 28, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José
 Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry at the capilla
 of San Lorenzo. Wife of Miguel Duran, both Indians of Picuris. She left no living
 children.


PICURIS, NEW MEXICO BURIALS IN 1843

- · **Maria Antonia Lugarda NS** April 28, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José Martinez, performed the funeral rites. She left no living children. A brother, Vicente Maestas, was in charge.
- Jose Bersabe Hurtado December 19, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry for the death of November 15. Two months old, legit s/ Jose Rafael Hurtado and Maria Estefana Sanchez, from the plaza of San Juan Nepomuceno.
- Maria Francisca Velasquez December 19, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry. She died on the 5th of the same month, buried at the cemetery of San Lorenzo. Parvula and one year old, legit d/ Mateo Velasquez and Maria Rafaela Ortega, from the plaza of San Jose de las Trampas.

Frame 664

- In this Mission of Picuris, on the twentieth day of the month of January, 1843, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry which took place on the fifth day of November of the immediately preceding year (1842) in the cemetery of the parish, for the body of Maria Matilde [Romero], parvula of eight months of age, legit d/ José Manuel Romero and Maria Guadalupe Sanchez, residents of San Antonio del Peñasco, and for the record, I signed. Antonio José Martinez
- Maria Manuela Trujillo January 2, 1844, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry. She died December 5, 1843, and was buried at the cemetery of the parish. Eight months old, legit d/ Manuel Silvestre Trujillo and Maria Guadalupe Vigil, from the plaza of Nuestra Señora de los Dolores de la Sieneguilla.
- José Antonio Chipipi January 2, 1844, I, the Parish Priest, Don Antonio José Martinez, performed the funeral rites and recorded the burial entry. He was buried on December 28, 1843. Widower of his second marriage to Juana Mestas, Indians from the pueblo of Picuris. He fell ill and died suddenly and left no children.


